What are my child's options to get courses needed for graduation or post-secondary requirements?

- Check if you can make changes to your schedule for Semester 2
- Take an online course with SAIL (Surrey Academy for Innovative Learning)
- Take a course in night school at Queen Elizabeth Continuing Education
- Take course in summer school (information available in the Spring, students who have graduated in June are not eligible)
- All options require you to meet with your counsellor

Do students need volunteer hours to graduate?

NO! But...

- The BC Ministry of Education requires students to complete **30 hours of Career Life Exploration**. This encompasses a variety of things:
- Volunteering
- Paid employment
- Obtaining certifications such as FoodSafe, Super Host, CPR Training, First Aid, Lifeguard, etc.
- Attending post-secondary or scholarship information sessions or campus tours
- 10 hours of the Capstone project
- Hours must be accumulated during the same year as Career Life Connections 12.

What if my child is missing prerequisites and have already graduated high school?

 All public funded post-secondary institutes offer academic upgrading (English 12, Physics, Math, etc.)

 Good option for students who have taken a gap year and may be missing courses required for a specific program


 Courses are free for mature students too (19+)



Important Conversations to Have with your Child

- What are you hoping to do after Grade 12?
- What options are you considering?
 - Post-Secondary (university, college, trades training)
 - Working
 - Gap Year (volunteer / travel)
- What are your values? Strengths? Interests?
- What skills do you want to develop?
- What do you want to become? How can you align the above (values / strengths / interests / skills) to education and career opportunities?

Not everyone's journey will look the same (and that's ok!)



Gap Year

- Focus on values, and skill development
- Job opportunities, working with current skills and strengths
- Volunteer, gain experience, develop skills, discover interests
- Make a plan for moving forward
- Upgrading high school classes
- Continuing education for professional development (First Aid, CPR Training, Food Safe, Computer Skills, Resume workshops, etc.)
- In BC, 51% of students typically go directly to post-secondary after graduation. By the time students are 29 years old, 81% of students have attended post-secondary (4 out of 5)
- Education is always waiting for them




BC Labour Market Outlook 2022-2032

Five industries will generate about half of all jobs over the next ten years in British Columbia.

- >> Health care and social assistance (149,700 job openings; 15 per cent of total)
- >> Professional, scientific and technical services (148,000 job openings; 15 per cent of total)
- >> Retail trade (115,500 job openings; 11 per cent of total)
- >> Construction (72,700 job openings; 7 per cent of total)
- >> Educational services (64,500 job openings; 6 per cent of total)

Nearly 80% of job seekers will need some form of post-secondary education or training.




Gathering information is important

- Find out the applications dates (open / close)
- Financial aid and scholarship deadlines
- Attend campus tours
- Attend program information sessions
- Make an appointment with an academic advisor
- Talk to people who are working in the field your child wants to pursue (job shadow, volunteer, informational interviews)





Two entry points to an apprenticeship


- Get hired / sponsored first, then go to school (6 weeks)
- Go to school first (6 months), then get hired / sponsored

How to apply to Post-Secondary

- 1. Go directly to post-secondary website, specific program, "apply now"
- 2. Create an account on educationplannerbc.ca
- 3. Complete applications on education planner or post-sec website
- 4. Pay application fee with a credit card
- 5. Send transcripts through the Student Transcript Service on the BCeID website
- 6. Once you submit an application, you will receive a confirmation email
- 7. Feb / March conditional letters of acceptance go out
- 8. May / June official acceptance and registration dates sent out







BCeID and Student Transcript Service

- First students register for a BASIC BCeID
- Then students register for the Student Transcript Service
- Personal Education Number (PEN) is required, as well as legal name and birthdate
- You must confirm your registration through email within 24 hours or your account will be deleted

BCeID and Student Transcript Service

- Once an account has been created, log into the STS
- You can view, download and print pdf versions of your transcript
- *Important to check and make sure all correct courses and grades have been included
- You can send transcripts to up to 25 post-secondary institutes for free
- There is an option students SHOULD click that allows postsecondary's to request and receive updates of transcripts
- This saves you from having to resend your final transcript

Open vs. Limited Intake

Open

- Often used in college / small universities
- Applications stay open, no limit on seats
- Grades not taken into consideration beyond min requirements
- Examples: most KPU programs

Limited

- Has a set number of seats per application cycle
- Applications stay open until classes are full
- Often have specific requirements (grades, courses)
- First come, first served
- Time is of the essence!
- Nursing programs, fashion design, trades programs

Competitive Intake

- Typically used in universities
- They want the best applicants
- Will have a closing date and will evaluate each qualified application after this date and admit a set number of the best applicants

UBC Stats

- For the 2022/2023 school year, UBC assessed over 89,000 personal profiles for undergraduate admissions.
- Mean grade range for all courses completed in gr 12
 - 89-91 percent for UBCV
 - 85-87% for UBCO
- They admitted 49% of applicants to UBCV and 73% of applicants to UBCO

 enrolment stats, admission rates and

UBC vs SFU vs KPU

UBC

- Consider grade 11/12 marks
- Must have a language 11
- Min. 70% English 11/12
- Recommended to have 6 grade 12 courses in addition to English 12
- Need to complete UBC Personal Profile volunteering, athletics, etc. are taken into consideration
- Must have a PROFICIENT or 3/4 on the Literacy 12 Assessment

SFU

- Consider grade 11/12 marks
- Must have a language 11
- Min. 70% in English 12
- Must have 5 approved grade 12 courses
- Tuition per year \$10,500 11,750

KPU

- Min. C+ in English 12 for all arts, science and business programs
- Limited intake programs may have more specific requirements
- Tuition per year \$5898.67



Common Routes to Your Educational Goal

The Direct Route

Enter post-secondary institution directly from high school.

The Transfer Route

Start at one institution, then transfer to another institution.

The Transfer Route

- For some students, starting at a smaller PSI and then transferring to a larger institution is a good option.
- Direct entry from high school to large universities (UBC / SFU / UVic) is more difficult that getting into a smaller institution (KPU / Douglas) and transferring after 2 yrs.
- It's less competitive to transfer after 2 yrs than and the universities.
- Transfer students are often more mature and have developed good study habits.
- Your final degree will be from the institution you finish at.
- Can be cost effective.

BC Transfer Guide



- The BC Transfer Guide is a useful tool to help students ensure they are taking the right courses to make transferring and easy process and limit the possibility of having to repeat courses
- Majority of course credits are transferable
- Use the BC Transfer Guide to check





Final Thoughts



Treat applying for scholarships like a part-time job. Putting aside time each week or month to work on scholarships will increase your chances of winning.



Don't just apply for the big ones – there are hundreds of scholarships out there, many are not advertised well which means there will be fewer applicants. Winning a couple hundred/thousand dollar scholarships is still a great return on your investment of time.



Scholarships beget scholarships – if you win once, you are more likely to win again. Receiving a scholarship increases confidence and can motivate you to apply for more. Also looks great on applications, resumes, etc. and can open up more opportunities.
